He also explained the proposed Order of The Swan, whose members would be pledged to make the Association perpetual. It was announced that the St. Louis Convention was cancelled due to the Depression. Mayor Bomberger welcomed the Association to the city, and delivered an address. Mrs. Hazel A. Spraker responded to the address. She mentioned that a copy of all genealogical data sent to the Association is given to the Kentucky Historical Society. At 2 p.m. there was a parade, with many floats. There is a large list of names of people and floats taking part in the 150th Anniversary parade. After the parade, the members visited the graves of William and Susanna Boone. A banquet was held that evening, followed by an Association meeting. It was decided to hold the next Convention in Washington, D. C. in 1932. Miss Bess Hawthorne, who had resigned as Secretary due to illness, was replaced by Charles Read Watson. The late Vice President Jesse P. Crump was replaced by Charles Howard Cline.
